## **FUTURE REGISTERED NURSES EXPERIENCE** "A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A NURSE"

Nursing Consortium of South Florida's annual program invites high school students to take glimpse at their future career

Ft. Lauderdale, FL - November 12, 2007 - A heart monitor registers the beat of a new born baby. CPR saves the life of a near-drowning victim. An elderly woman receives medication for her high blood pressure. Each of these jobs, and more, is paramount to a career in nursing. Today, high schoolers from all over South Florida have the opportunity to experience life as a registered nurse.

Each year, the Nursing Consortium of South Florida (the Consortium), a coalition of hospitals, nursing schools, health care agencies, and foundations, organizes the "A Day in the Life of a Nurse" program for high school students interested in pursuing a career as a registered nurse. The goal of the Consortium is to ensure that students see the important work that nurses do and are inspired to adequately prepare themselves for a career in nursing. Many students who participate in the event are area magnet school students where part of the curriculum focuses on careers in healthcare.

"This event provides high school students with an opportunity to shadow registered nurses and provide a glimpse into their future career," said Claudia Distrito, President of the Nursing Consortium of South Florida. "Our goal is to encourage students to continue pursuing their career in nursing and show them the life saving and sustaining tasks the nurses provide to patients."



Students participating in the one-day program take part in various activities including tours of key hospital departments conducted by "real nurses." This experience allows students to spend time with the nurse and ask them individual questions about their profession, their challenges, and their nursing stories. Students also meet and hear from nurse educators, information systems nurses, nurse researchers, and nurse administrators. In addition to shadowing staff nurses and listening to various presentations, student experiences can include perform simple duties such as taking a person's blood pressure, pulse and listening to their heart beat through a stethoscope, and scrubbing in and dressing out in surgical attire and touring a surgical room where they may handle high tech equipment. A total of thirty-four South Florida facilities are participating.

"It is very exciting to see so many students who are enthusiastic about their potential as a future nurse," said Suzanne Luongo, Clinical Education Manager for the Memorial Healthcare System. "We are very fortunate to have an organization like the Nursing Consortium in our community to make this event a reality. I am looking forward to seeing many of these students back to our facility as employees in the coming years."
